On May 5th, 2012, Watchen Harris Bruce was in the audience at LDG's first *Face-2-Face* (*F2F*) held in Germantown, Maryland. Watchen liked what she saw and heard about LDG and its focus on helping Liberians help themselves that the following Monday she filled out her LDG membership form and mailed it along with her \$50 dollar yearly due. Less than three weeks later she received a phone call with thrilling news: She had been appointed Chief of Party for the Development Credit Authority and Loan Guarantee Program, a USAID funded project that will provide loans to Liberian-owned enterprises.

A USAID press release announcing the program said its goal "is to increase lending to clean energy and agriculturally linked small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs)." The guarantee program, the release noted, "will support this objective through risk sharing with Ecobank to increase the number of loans they provide as well as to increase their lending experience with the two sectors."

As Chief of Party for the program, Watchen will be returning to Liberia with almost 30 years of banking experience in various capacities, including a tenure as Vice President in PNC Bank's Business Banking Division. Watchen says she looks forward to working in her new position with all Liberians, including Liberians from the Diaspora, to help grow the agricultural and clean energy sectors. (LDG)

2. Up-Coming Lecture Series

The Planning Committee will hold two LDG F2F Lectures in the coming months. The next one is planned for sometime in September and the Ambassador of Botswana, Tebelelo Seretse, has agreed to be our guest speaker. She is likely to speak to us on the theme, "Natural Resources and Development: Lessons to be Learned from the Botswana Experience." The theme is a play on the fact that Botswana has wisely used income from its heavy deposit of diamonds to develop the country and quickly, after independence in 1966, moved from being one of the poorest countries in the world to becoming a middle income country with a per capita GDP of \$13,000, boasting one of the best health care systems in all of Africa. The Committee is working on securing a good location in Baltimore, Philadelphia or the DC Area for the event. Exact date and time will be announced once the Committee settles on a location.

3. Clothing/Food for the Needy

EUGENE BULL is working on a project that will ship items such as clothing and canned foods to needy people in Liberia. As Eugene sees it, there are institutions such as churches and libraries that will allow individuals to station containers in which people can drop specified items, such as shoes, clothing, or canned food. Those items will then be collected and shipped free of charge to Liberia under a program sponsored by Firestone. 4. Expanding PEFSP

Per report by El-Tumu Trueh, we are contemplating expanding our Primary Education Fees Subsidy Program to increase beneficiaries from 30-100 per year.

From all indications, including feedback from guests, LDG's first *FACE-2-FACE* (*F2F*) was a smashing success. The more than 100 people who attended the event listened to Ambassador Somduth Soborun give an inspiring speech on the secrets behind Mauritius remarkable record of political stability and economic prosperity. According to Soborun, his country's success can be explained by a number of factors, such as an emphasis on political tolerance and compromise, a unique partnership between the government, labor, and business, and prudent use of public resources, including heavy investments in education. The results of these policies are plainly self-evident. In just 40 years of independence, Mauritius has seen its per capita GDP grow from a meager \$400 per annum to \$8,000 per annum, putting Mauritius in the ranks of middle-income countries.

F2F AUDIENCE ENGAGE SOBORUN



The audience engaged our guest speaker with probing questions as they sought solutions to the development problems of Liberia. The *F2F* keynote speaker, Ambassador Somduth Soborun, described policies and practices in Mauritius, designed in concert by a **government-business-trade union** engagement, which brought unemployment down to 0%—wisely using the country's only resources, human capital and scenic island beauty, to achieve its economic boom. *(LDG)*
